Infant and Toddler

Snowball Balance

This activity is great for promoting fine motor coordination in little ones! To set up the Snowball Balance all you need is paper towel rolls and crumpled up white paper (or newspaper).

- Cut the paper towel rolls to a variety of lengths and then arrange them on the floor distanced from each other.
- Have your child help you crumple up the white paper or newspaper into balls and then practice balancing them on top of the paper towel rolls!



· The taller the rolls, the more difficult it will be. For added difficulty, you can use kitchen tongs to place the "snowballs"!

Hot Chocolate Cloud Dough

This Hot Chocolate Cloud Dough smells like happy winter memories and is a lot of fun to shape and build with!

- Measure 8 cups of flour into a large container and mix in 2 to 4 cups of hot chocolate mix until it is the desired color. The more you add, the more it will look the color of hot chocolate!

Cardboard Snowmen

Don't have snow outside? No problem! To make Cardboard Snowmen are cardboard boxes you will need simple crafting supplies

- 3 boxes of assorted sizes, white paper wrapping paper would work best, scissors, glue, paint, brushes, etc.
- Each piece will represent a different part of the snowman. Children may enjoy making different sets of snowmen (examples: different color schemes, assorted facial expressions, etc.) and then mixing and matching to see all the different snowmen they can

Painting Snow

For this activity, you will need a...

- Large bin, snow (ice will work if there is no snow on the ground), smaller containers, water, food coloring, brushes, and eyedroppers or basters.
- Mix up a different color of paint in each container by mixing water with food coloring and spread the snow (or ice) along the bottom of the large bin.
- Children will use brushes and basters or eyedroppers to paint the snow however they would like to and see how the colors mix and interact with the cold snow.
- When they are done, you may even want to print a piece of paper on the painted snow to get a print of their work!
